This year saw wages increase for all our staff; recognition for years of service pension benefits for staff who have been in the field for 15 yrs; 10 yr and 5 years; there was new money for equipment and furniture; indigenous & diversity enhancement and staff recruitment & retention. Amazon & local child care suppliers are also prospering from these grants.

I want to thank The Winnipeg Foundation for their continued support and constant care to address the needs of our centre and others. The Nourishing Potential grant and the Summer Camp grants are so important to our program, both giving children opportunities for food security and outdoor experiences.

Thank you all for your support to Kings Park Child Care Centre.

# Treasurer's Report

2022-2023

#### Hello everyone,

As the Treasurer of KPCC, it is my responsibility to report on the financial picture and to give you a general overview of our financial plan. The past two years of prosperity within the Child Care Sector has made my volunteer job on board quite rewarding.

Watching child care receive [ three streams of grant funding:

- Quality Early Learning and Environments Grant: \$33.8 million to help improve aging infrastructure, equipment and materials; [our portion is \$77,875]
- Enhancing Diversity and Inclusion Grant: \$18.7 million to ensure children of all backgrounds
  and abilities feel a sense of belonging and have the ability to participate in programming
  through enriched curricula, space adaptations and staff-development opportunities; and [our
  portion is \$44,500]
- Innovative Recruitment and Retention Grant: \$7.4 million to implement creative and innovative strategies to recruit, retain and support a high-quality workforce and meet the demands of a rapidly growing sector] [our portion is \$17,800]

The announcement of \$10/day child care was fabulous news for parents. It has meant more administrative time for our management team to process the other side of this parent savings. The centre now receives a Parent Reduced Fee grant each quarter that covers the \$10.80 balance of the previous daily per diem of \$20.80/day. This grant, as like all others, requires extra time to process and ensure that funds are correctly allocated and properly recorded.

#### Wage Equity Increases in June 2022

KPCC updated our Working Salary Scale to reflect higher wages for our staff. While wage equity sounds like a fair and representational news bite, we like to point out that centers such as KPCC pays a much higher rent/sq ft than other centers, yet the funding is based on the number of children and rent expenses do not enter the equation. So KPCC continues to struggle between balancing the wages of our staff vs the programming wish-list.

Working in partnership with Mike, Ali, Yinka and the rest of the board members, we are always aware of the fragility of a non-profit child care centre. With the recent Multilateral Agreement for Early Learning, it has made our volunteer jobs as financial stewards so much easier. This next statement was in my report from last year - "While in this fiscal year, we still held onto our restraints, not knowing what the details of the agreement would look like but I can assure you, next year's AGM report will be over the top with funding announcements and salary wage increases." - to see the words bear fruit has been great news for all our employees and the families we serve.


